Campaign addresses barriers to suicide prevention

Focus group feedback showing low consumer awareness of local suicide prevention services and how to access them has prompted a new digital media campaign.

Brisbane North PHN developed the campaign as part of its local implementation of the Australian Government-funded National Suicide Prevention Trial (NSPT).

The campaign website – <u>www.reasonstostay.com.au</u> – provides information about accessing face-to-face services or telephone support in the Brisbane North region.

Chief Executive Officer Abbe Anderson said the campaign targets people who are experiencing or at risk of experiencing a suicidal crisis, and those who are concerned about a friend or family member.

"The Reasons to Stay campaign encourages people to reach out and start a conversation, so they can find their reasons to stay," Ms Anderson said.

"This message complements other campaigns currently in circulation and highlights that you don't need to be a health professional to start a conversation around suicide prevention," she said.

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An Australian Government Initiative

The PHN ran community consultations in 2016 that showed:

- the Brisbane North region lacked a clear pathway to follow for people experiencing a suicidal crisis, those who have made a suicide attempt or those who have been bereaved by suicide
- health and other professionals in the region did not have a good understanding of the appropriate services to refer people
- people experiencing suicidal crisis or who have made a suicide attempt often present to a hospital Emergency Department (ED) for help and support.

Ms Anderson said that while presenting to the ED was sometimes the right first step, consultations showed that EDs are not necessarily the best place for a person in crisis.

"By increasing local community knowledge of suicide prevention generally, specific suicide prevention services and resources available in the region, the Reasons to Stay campaign aims to guide people experiencing a crisis toward more appropriate longer-term support," Ms Anderson said.

The Reasons to Stay campaign aligns with the NSPT-funded Yarns Heal campaign, targeting the region's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population, and the Talking Helps campaign that is targeting the LGBTI population.

A quick PIP QI update

The Practice Incentives Program (PIP) Quality Improvement (QI) Incentive started on 1 August 2019.

Under the PIP QI Incentive, general practices work with their local Primary Health Network (PHN) to undertake continuous quality improvement activities through the collection and review of practice data on specified improvement measures.

In the North Brisbane and Moreton Bay region 197 practices have registered to receive the PIP QI payment.

With the PIP QI Incentive payment now in place, the PHN will continue to act as a regional data custodian and store de-identified practice data in accordance with the data governance guidelines.

Once practices have registered for the PIP QI through Health Professional Online Services (HPOS) using their PRODA account they will need to notify the PHN as soon as possible, by contacting their Primary Care Liaison Officer.

GOAS benefits continue, 12 months on

The results of the Geriatric Assessment Outreach Service (GOAS) pilot project, announced just over a year ago, have left a lasting legacy for the care of older people in Brisbane North.

Jointly funded by Brisbane North PHN and Metro North Hospital and Health Service, the GOAS pilot project began in June 2017 and was trialled over 12 months in 24 Residential Aged Care Facilities (RACFs) across The Prince Charles Hospital catchment.

The GOAS model-of-care comprised of an outreach geriatricianled, 5-day service and training for RACFs on clinical pathways.

An internal evaluation found the trial had improved the quality of care provided to acutely unwell aged care residents and reduced potentially preventable emergency department presentations, at a significant cost saving to the health system. The trial was so successful, it contributed to an expansion of the Nurse Navigator-led Residential Aged Care District Assessment and Referral (RADAR) Service outreach service to all RACFs in the Brisbane North region.

The RADAR Service provides one point of contact for RACFs needing medical support for acutely unwell and deteriorating older people in their care. RADAR services include:

- emergency department alternatives
- facilitating hospital admissions
- RACF resident post discharge medication review
- advice for navigating hospital services.

Challenge ageism to overcome discrimination, aged care sector told

Ageism and ageist stereotypes must be acknowledged as commonplace in society as a first step in preventing discrimination against older people, according to a keynote speaker at the recent Brisbane North Annual Aged Care Forum.

Kirsty Nowlan is the Executive Director of the Benevolent Society and spoke at the forum on 12 September 2019 about the advocacy campaign it is running against ageism called Every Age Counts.

"Ageism can happen to people at any age," Ms Nowlan said, which she defined as "stereotyping, discrimination and mistreatment based solely upon age."

However, she explained that the Every Age Counts campaign is, "specifically interested in ageism against older people, which comes from negative attitudes and beliefs about what it means to get older."

Technical definitions aside, Ms Nowlan said we actually know what ageism feels like.

"Does this make me look old?" is an often heard refrain from friends, wives and mothers, motivated by a fear of ageing, Ms Nowlan said.

"For most of us, we encounter ageism firstly in an incident that happens to someone else," she said.

"Or it may be a first time you take your parent to a doctor, because they're sick, not old, and the doctor talks to you, not them. "And can we all just acknowledge that the systemic abuse of older people in institutions has, at its foundations, the sure and steady belief that some lives matter less than others."

Even well-intentioned expressions such as 'sweetie' can be construed by an older person as belittling and Ms Nowlan proposed using a person's name instead.

According to Benelovent Society research, Ms Nowlan said that 71 per cent of people surveyed had not thought about ageism, but when prompted 72 per cent thought it was important.

Furthermore, only 16 per cent considered themselves active in doing something about it.

"I suggest our first task is to make ageism a thing in this country," Ms Nowlan said.

"What we need to do is start naming those experiences as what they are. We are yet to start calling it discrimination and we need to start. Because this is fundamentally an othering process. A creation of us and them," she said.

The event's other presenters included aged care consumer Daphne Pirie AO MBE who talked about using life's experiences to survive old age with dignity. Ms Pirie spoke from personal experience about her childhood, through to her recent health issues and caring for her husband before he passed away.

The program also included a Reablement Panel Discussion, moderated by BallyCara's Paul Johnson.

Other interactive sessions included an on-stage interview between Bronwyn Bidstrup from COTA and Zelda Lawrie, a contributor to the Faces of Ageing photo exhibition shown at the forum.

Ruth Northcott from the University of the 3rd Age explained how caring for people's health involved more than just physical care, and stressed the importance of ongoing learning, personal growth and social connection for healthy ageing.

LASA Queensland State Manager Chris Edith provided a general sector update, including the latest on the Royal Commission and the new Aged Care Standards.

Government contributions to the program included Joshua Maldon, from the Home Support and Assessment Branch at the Commonwealth Department of Health, who spoke on reablement in aged care services.

Also presenting was Andy Carter from Metro North Hospital and Health Service. As Director of Nursing, Community and Oral Health, Mr Carter spoke about the role of the Aged Care Ambassador.

Traditional ceremony connects Gubbi Gubbi babies to country

Last month, 40 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander babies and 8 children were welcomed onto Kabi Kabi/Gubbi Gubbi country as part of the second annual Wunya Baby to Country Ceremony.

The babies and children were welcomed to country by Traditional Custodian, Aunty Lynette Johannessen.

Each baby received a kangaroo fur, a hand made leather headband and a certificate. Each family had the opportunity to plant a native seedling in the *yourtown* garden to signify a connection to the country.

The Wunya Baby to Country Ceremony is part of the implementation process of *First 1,000 Days Australia* in the Moreton Bay region.

The event acknowledges Elders, families, and the carers of our future generations and has allowed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders to revive practices that celebrate children, country and connection to land.

The ceremony is a whole community initiative, inclusive of a working group, sponsors, volunteers and community members.

Over 300 people attended the Wunya Baby to Country Ceremony, which uniquely provides a culturally safe space for local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families to come together to celebrate culture.

Shared care for kidney health

In August, Metro North Hospital and Health Service (MNHHS) and Brisbane North PHN launched a shared care model for chronic kidney disease, aiming to improve the patient experience with more efficient care.

The shared care model, launched as part of an education event, aims to improve integration between primary care, GP with Special Interests (GPwSI) and nephrologists of Metro North Kidney Health Service.

The new model will establish shared roles and responsibilities, communication and referral pathways, and ongoing care and management plans to ensure less duplication and greater coordination between primary, secondary and tertiary care.

The model will utilise a patient held 'journey handbook' to promote collaboration between involved clinicians and allied health professionals. The handbook will also act as a tool for patient empowerment and education and will complement the usual clinical communication that takes place.

The launch and education event was attended by a diverse group of clinicians—from both hospital and primary care backgrounds—allowing for cross-pollination of knowledge and ideas around the care of patients with chronic kidney disease in the Caboolture region.

Time to be liver smart

Liver cancer rates are on the rise. Estimates have shown 65 per cent of liver cancer deaths can be prevented with early detection and treatment programs for those who are at high risk.

Around 34.4 per cent of liver cancer cases in Australia are attributable to hepatitis B and hepatitis C. In the North Brisbane and Moreton Bay region there are an estimated 8,000 people living with hepatitis C.

The Be Liver Smart project provides support to general practices to promote GP centred care options for the management of hepatitis C in the community. Participant practices benefit from expert clinical support including fast tracked referrals, training and education and additional inpractice support through the Be Liver Smart community nurse. The event included presentations by Kidney Health Australia, delivered by the MNHHS team including Dr Helen Healy (Nephrologist and Director, Renal Medicine, Kidney Health Service, MNHHS), Dr Pedro Gois (Consultant Nephrologist), Dr Gary Chang (GPwSI Chronic Kidney Disease) and Carla Scuderi (Pharmacist Advanced).

Attendance at the event will enable GPs to offer the chronic kidney disease shared care model to patients who meet the eligibility criteria.

The event is part of a wider Queensland Health funded project called Keeping Kidneys in the Community with future education events to be announced shortly.

New Metro North foot ulcer clinics

The Metro North foot ulcer clinics aim to prevent hospitalisation by managing foot disease in an ambulatory setting and to prevent avoidable lower limb amputations by delivering early and effective interventions for people with foot disease.

The clinics can be found at Caboolture Hospital, Redcliffe Hospital, The Prince Charles Hospital and Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital and referred patients will be allocated based on their postcode and clinical complexity.

To be eligible, the person has a chronic foot ulcer or an acute Charcot foot but the person is not required to have diabetes mellitus to be accepted into the service.

At the foot ulcer clinic the patient will receive:

- neuro-vascular assessment
- wound assessment
- assessment of foot function and conditions of the skin
- review of the social and physical factors that may affect self-care
- offloading options for plantar wounds, including: total contact casting, removable cast walkers, medical grade footwear and orthotics
- wound management and sufficient dressing to be used between appointments
- where clinically relevant: investigations at the Metro North facilities; escalation of care to consultant-led clinics; transition of care to outpatient high risk community clinic.

The referrer will receive:

- timely and expert care for the person with a foot ulcer
- communication from the podiatrist that the referral has been received and the initial management plan
- invitation to be involved with shared care arrangements
- communication when there is a significant change to the management plan such as when the patient's care has been escalated to the multidisciplinary clinic.

If a foot wound is not improving, do not hesitate to refer to the foot ulcer clinic, the Metro North Hospital and Health Service entry point for foot ulcers.

Important information to include in the referral:

- duration of foot ulcer
- health summary medical conditions, allergies and current medications
- results of recent investigations undertaken, such as: Xrays, duplex arterial scans, pathology
- other specialists involved in the patient's care, such as: vascular surgeon, ID physician, endocrinologist
- **history** of previous foot ulcers or lower limb amputation.

News in brief

Emergency drug supply for treatment of syphilis

From September 2019, the antibiotic benzathine benzlypenicillin (Bicillin L-A) is listed on the Emergency Drug Supply Schedule (also known as Prescribers Bag) in response to an ongoing infectious syphilis outbreak in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Queensland, Northern Territory, Western Australia and South Australia.

Cases of infectious syphilis continue to be diagnosed in outbreak regions, particularly in males and females aged 15-29 years.

The listing of benzathine benzylpenicillin (Bicillin L-A) is intended to support the timely treatment of syphilis in nonremote settings for Aboriginal communities by providing a mechanism for these health services to have stock on site, or obtain supply for patients in advance of a consultation.

Changes to National Immunisation Program

Following the Australian Government's recent changes to the childhood and adolescent National Immunisation Program schedule the Department of Human Services has commenced sending additional reminder letters to individuals overdue for vaccination.

Currently, parents of children overdue for vaccination are sent reminder letters when their children are 10, 21 and 54 months. From June 2019, additional letters will be sent to families for children aged 7, 13, 15, 19 and 49 months. Adolescents who are overdue for their childhood and adolescent vaccinations will be sent letters when they are 14.5, 17 and 18 years of age.

These additional letters advise individuals to contact their GP to receive missed vaccines while they are still eligible to receive funded catch-up immunisations through the program.

Vaccination providers should be aware of a potential increase in patients seeking assistance regarding potentially overdue vaccinations.

Essure contraceptive device recall

Women who have had an Essure contraceptive device inserted in a Queensland Health facility are being invited to undergo a medical review at their local hospital with a referral from their GP. Health issues reported with the device include changes in menstrual bleeding, unintended pregnancy, chronic pain, perforation, migration/ movement of the device, and allergy/ hypersensitivity or immune-type reactions.
